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Pathway Focus - A Levels

What are A Levels?

A Levels (Advanced Level qualifications) are academic courses usually studied over two years after Year 11, often in a sixth form or college. Students typically choose **3 subjects**, sometimes 4, that interest them or link to a future career goal.

Who are A Levels for?

Students who enjoy academic learning

Those considering university, especially competitive courses

Anyone unsure about a specific job, but wanting to keep options open

Things to consider:

 \checkmark Some university courses have subject requirements (e.g. Medicine needs Chemistry & Biology)

 \checkmark A Levels are mostly exam-based — good revision skills are important

✓ You'll usually need **at least 5 GCSEs at grade 5 or above**, including English and Maths — some subjects require grade 6 or higher.

Where can A Levels lead?

- University or degree apprenticeships
- Higher apprenticeships or work
- Further training in a specialist area

Parent Tip of the Month

"Questions to ask on an open evening"

- How is the course assessed (exams, coursework, practical)?
- What are the entry requirements?
- How do you support students who are struggling or have additional needs?
- What does a typical week/timetable look like?
- Are there enrichment activities (clubs, trips, volunteering)?
- What do students go on to do afterwards university, apprenticeships, jobs?
- Do you offer careers advice and help with applications or CVs?
- Can you help students get work experience?

Top Tip: Let your child lead the conversation when possible. It builds confidence and gives them a chance to see how they feel in the new environment.
